COVID-19: Highlights and Situation Overview

Global Update

- Worldwide, there have been over 492 million cases, almost 6.2 million deaths (corrected from previous report 6.6 million on April 1, 2022) attributed to COVID-19, with a case fatality rate (CFR) of 1.3%.
- According to Bluedot's COVID Brief, the top 5 countries with the highest 7-day rolling average of daily cases of COVID-19 include: (1) South Korea, (2) Germany, (3) France, (4) Vietnam, and (5) United Kingdom. Meanwhile, the 5 countries with highest 7-day average of daily cases per million population include: (1) South Korea, (2) St. Pierre-Miquelon, (3) Cook Islands, (4) American Samoa, and (5) Cyprus. The incidence rates of COVID-19 among continents with largest proportion of countries: (1) 44% of Oceana (7 out of 16 countries) have high (>350 per 100,000) incidence rate in the past 14 days, (2) 16% of Africa (9 of 56 countries) have low to moderate (≤140-350) incidence rate in the past 14 days, and (3) 68% of Africa (38 of 56 countries) have low (≤140) incidence rate in the past 14 days. The five highest countries in terms of cumulative individuals fully vaccinated in very 100,000 population include: (1) Gibraltar, 122,540, (2) United Arab Emirate, 96,120, (3) Brunei Darussalam, 91,710, and (5) Singapore, 91,040.
- The World Health Organization (WHO) reported, Omicron remains the dominant variant of COVID-19 globally. Among the 382,789 sequenced to GISAID in the last 30 days, 99.7% (381,824) were Omicron, only less than 0.1% (175) were Delta, and 0.2% (649) sequenced were not assigned to a Pango lineage. The WHO also reported that more than 600 cases of XE variant, a recombinant of BA.1 and BA.2 subvariants of Omicron, have been first detected in the United Kingdom (UK) on January 19. The XE variant is estimated to be 10% more transmissible than the dominant BA.2 subvariant, but further confirmation is needed. The Health Security Agency of UK is also monitoring XD and XF variants which are recombinants of Delta and BA.1 subvariant of Omicron. Recombinant variants are not unusual, especially if there are existence of multiple variants and many of them have been identified over the course of the pandemic.
- South Korea has reported 127,190 new COVID-19 cases on April 4, a hundred thousand less than the cases on Sunday, partly due to
 fewer tests done over the weekend. The new COVID-19 cases in the country have dropped to the lowest tally in six weeks, but there are
 still concerns of another surge over the eased protocols against the virus. The government of Korea eased social distancing rules for two
 weeks in a move to boost economy of small businesses. Furthermore, private gatherings have been allowed up to 10 people from eight,
 and business operating hours have been extended by one hour to midnight. Fully vaccinated citizens in Korea are more than 44.5 million
 (86.7% of 52 million population), and 63.9% have been boosted according to the KDCA data. Health authorities of Korea are considering
 to allow people to be mask-free outdoors if the virus continue to wane for the next two weeks.

Regional Update

• Brunei: Children aged 5-11 regardless of vaccination status will be back to face-to-face in school on May 14, the education minister said. The decision to resume face-to-face classes was decided after the decline trend of COVID-19 in the country; furthermore, 50,000 students are expected to return to school on May 14. International schools in Brunei were initially given with the permission to resume face-to-face on April 11, which also coincide the start of their third school term. Brunei recorded less than 1,000 new cases for nine straight days after daily cases of the third wave of pandemic has reached up to 4,885 on March 3.

- Cambodia: Australia has committed to provide Cambodia with 33 ultra-low temperature freezers for the storage of COVID-19 vaccines and as cooperative support to the agricultural sector. The freezers to be donated by Australia were part of the larger AU\$35.7 million (US\$26.7 million) package to be delivered in partnership with UNICEF. Only 33 new COVID-19 cases were reported on April 3 in Cambodia.
- Malaysia: Ministry of Health recorded 12,380 new cases of COVID-19 on April 3, as cases continue to decline in the country and as they
 begin their transition towards endemicity to loosen more restrictions. The decline in cases helped reduce the burden on Malaysia's
 healthcare system as more beds and equipment are freed that allow to focus them on more critical patients. The country's hospital bed
 utilization rate was just over 57% on April 3 and admission were just averaging 873 compared to 2,000 daily admissions in March. ICU
 admissions for COVID-19 patients in Malaysia were just 27% and overall utilization rate of 55%.
- Singapore: The Ministry of Health (MOH) will review the relevance of TraceTogether app and vaccination-differentiated safe management measurements as Singapore transitions to living with COVID-19. MOH said that they no longer rely on TraceTogether for contact tracing the general public as majority of its citizens are already fully vaccinated.
- Thailand records its first case of XE variant of COVID-19, Public Health Commission Vice-Chairman Chalermchai Boonyaleephan said on April 2. The case was reported by the Centre for Medical Genomics, Ramathibodi Hospital. The Vice-Chairman has predicted that the new virus might spread in Thailand. He added that it is important for them to monitor the severity of XE and its resistance against the available COVID-19 vaccines and to whether it could replace the current dominant BA.2 subvariant of Omicron. If this happens, this could be the fifth wave of COVID-19 in Thailand. The country is expecting to peak between April and May before declining in June to allow lifting restrictions in the country.

Vaccine Update

- Laos: The daily COVID-19 surge in Laos has reached its record high of positivity rate of 50%. The country is now focused in accelerating its vaccinations against the virus and urged its citizens to vaccinate their children and family. Amid vaccine shortage, Laos government went as far recommending herbal and traditional medicines to combat COVID-19, including plant extracts to help build immunity. The deputy director of communicable diseases control department of Laos, encourages its citizen to get boosted regardless of vaccine brand received after three months to boost their immune system against the deadly virus.
- Myanmar: More than 50 million COVID-19 vaccines were administered, the ministry of health reported on April 3. Only 66 new confirmed COVID-19 cases were reported and a daily of positivity rate was as low as 0.57% only after 11,512 laboratory samples have been tested in the past 24 hours.
- Philippines: More than 27 million COVID-19 vaccine doses purchased by the government and private sector are expiring in July. The cost
 of the vaccines that are about to expire are about PHP13 billion according to Presidential Adviser for Entrepreneurship Joey Concepcion
 and Senate Minority Leader Franklin Drilon. Inter-Agency Task Force for the Management of Emerging Infectious Diseases (IATF) were
 advised to require booster shots for people entering establishments by June or July to encourage more fully vaccinated Filipinos to get
 their booster. More than 65.8 million Filipinos are full vaccinated against COVID-19; however, only 12 million are boosted.

 Vietnam: Vaccine passports will be issued beginning April 15, according to the Health Ministry. Vietnam's vaccine passport will include name, date of birth, diseases which they're vaccinated against, number of doses and date of vaccination, and QR code. The vaccine passport will be used in conjunction with other valid IDs. Data that identify people will not be encoded into QR codes for security reasons. QR codes of vaccine passports must be renewed every 12 months and they will be notified before expiry. Vietnam has currently administered more than 200 million COVID-19 vaccine doses.

Travel Advisories (new update/s)

- Laos: In a bid to counter economic fallout, the government of Laos has reopened its country for foreign tourists; however, some restrictions are still in place. Foreign tourists are required to be at least fully vaccinated from the past 14 days before arrival, get tested with RT-PCR before departure, and hold a mandated health insurance policy.
- Malaysia has finally reopened its borders for fully vaccinated and unvaccinated foreign tourists as the country made the transition to the endemic phase. However, foreign travelers are still required to show a negative RT-PCR test taken 48 hours before departure regardless of vaccination status.

Cases and Deaths as of 04 April 2022

- As of 04 April 2022 (2PM, GMT+8), worldwide, there were 492,344,707 confirmed cases, including 6,182,083 deaths. Globally, Case Fatality Rate (CFR) was 1.3.
- 51,565,273 confirmed cases of COVID-19 have been reported in the ASEAN +3 countries including 29,649,157 cases in the ASEAN region and 21,916,116 cases in the PLUS THREE countries, with CFR of 0.8.
