COVID-19: Highlights and Situation Overview

Global Update

- **Worldwide**, there have been over 555 million cases and over 6 million deaths attributed to COVID-19.
- Australia has surpassed the grim milestone of 10,000 Covid-19 deaths, as authorities urge people to remain vigilant against the disease. The country's toll from the virus stood at 9,984 on Saturday, and tipped past the 10,000-mark with Sunday's numbers. New South Wales reported an additional two Covid deaths on Sunday, South Australia recorded six, while Victoria reported another 22. Ahead of a health ministers' meeting, the federal health minister, Mark Butler, said authorities were expecting a further wave of the virus in the coming months. He pointed to the BA.4 and BA.5 subvariants taking hold across the country. Queensland reported no new Covid deaths on Sunday after the state's chief health officer, John Gerrard, said on Saturday there was increasing pressure to bring back mask mandates. The state's minister for health and ambulance services, Yvette D'Ath, said on Sunday there was no change in mask rules. On Australia surpassing 10,000 deaths, D'Ath said people needed to remind themselves of the virus's continuing global impact, with people still dying every day.

Regional Update

- Cambodia: Over 140,000 doses of the Pfizer-manufactured COVID-19 vaccines donated by Poland arrived in Cambodia on the morning of July 3, with the government planning to administer the jabs to children aged 5-12. Ministry of Health secretary of state York Sambath said at a ceremonial handover at Phnom Penh International Airport that this is the second vaccine donation to Cambodia from Poland, demonstrating the bonds of friendship between their governments and peoples. Sambath said Cambodia is thankful to Poland and its fellow EU members as well as all of the other countries around the world who have provided donations of vaccines to the Kingdom. According to the health ministry, over 94% of the population had been vaccinated as of June 2. More than nine million people have received their third doses, nearly three million their fourth and over 310,000 their fifth. Hun Sen also stated that he might reinstate the mask-wearing in public mandate again if large-scale transmission of COVID-19 begins.
- Philippines: Active COVID-19 cases nationwide have surpassed 9,000, data from the Department of Health (DOH) showed. Based on DOH's latest figures, the country registered an additional 1,302 COVID-19 cases on Saturday, raising the number of active infections to 9,105. The country logged more than 1,000 new cases for three consecutive days since June 30. The overall case count stands at 3,706,951. Meanwhile, total COVID-19 recoveries and the death toll are at 3,637,268 and 60,578, respectively. According to independent analytics group OCTA Research fellow Guido David, most of the fresh COVID-19 infections, or 625 cases, were recorded in Metro Manila. Of the 625 new cases in the capital region, more than 100 were listed in Quezon City. Pateros is the only local government unit in the capital region that did not record a new case.
- **South Korea**'s new coronavirus cases stayed above 10,000 for the second consecutive day on Sunday as the daily cases seemed to be rising again after months of subsiding. The country added 10,059 COVID-19 infections, including 191 cases from overseas, bringing the total caseload to 18,389,611, the Korea Disease Control and Prevention Agency (KDCA) was quoted as saying by Yonhap news agency. The country reported eight COVID-19 deaths, raising the death toll to 24,570. The fatality rate stood at 0.13 per cent. The number of critically ill patients stood at 53, the KDCA said. South Korea's Covid-19 outbreaks have shown a downward trend after daily new cases peaked at an all-time high of over 620,000 in mid-March. But the KDCA has said the pace of decline has

recently slowed down amid waning vaccine immunity and increasing social interactions following eased social distancing rules, and that a possible spike in infections lies ahead. Sunday's figure is up by more than 3,800 from a week ago and nearly 4,000 from two weeks ago. Imported cases have remained above 100 since June 24 due to a rise in international flights. Of the 9,868 locally transmitted cases, Seoul accounted for 2,437 cases, with the surrounding Gyeonggi Province reporting 2,637 cases. There were 516 infections in Incheon, 40 km west of Seoul. The greater Seoul area accounted for 56 per cent of the total caseload.

- China: Parts of eastern China are running new rounds of mass COVID-19 testing, as the country faces new waves of infections while recovering from the impact of the outbreak that hit Beijing and Shanghai. In the eastern province of Anhui, which reported most of China's local cases in the latest flare-up, its provincial capital Hefei said late on July 3 (Sunday) that it is doing citywide testing every three days. Anhui's Si town, where its 760,000 residents were told to stay home except for going out to do COVID-19 tests, mandated citywide testing on July 4 (Monday), its seventh round of mass testing. Lingbi town, also in Anhui, locked down its nearly 1 million residents and said it had canceled an event for local businesses to meet government officials. In the southeastern province of Fujian, the Jiaocheng district and the town of Xiapu in the city of Ningde ran mass testing on July 3 (Sunday). Ningde on the other hand reported 10 domestically transmitted COVID-19 infections on July 3 (Sunday). China's National Health Commission said on July 4 (Monday) that the country reported a total of 380 new local infections for July 3, of which 41 were symptomatic and 339 were asymptomatic. The infections were detected in the provinces of Anhui, Jiangsu, Liaoning, Fujian, Shandong, Shaanxi, Zhejiang, Guangdong and Sichuan, as well as in the city of Shanghai. There were no new deaths, keeping the nation's reported fatalities at 5,226.
- Macao kicked off a new round of city-wide COVID-19 testing on Monday (Jul 4) for its more than 600,000 residents, as officials raced to contain a spiraling number of cases in the worst outbreak to hit the world's biggest gambling hub since the pandemic began. Coronavirus testing for all residents will take place three times this week across the city, with people also required to take rapid antigen tests in-between. The move comes as the former Portuguese colony reported 90 new cases on Sunday, taking the total number of infections to 784 since the middle of June. More than 11,000 people are in guarantine. While Macao, a Chinese special administrative region, has not introduced a full-scale lockdown seen in mainland Chinese cities like Shanghai, the city is already largely closed. All non-essential government services are shut, schools, parks, sports and entertainment facilities are closed and restaurants can only provide takeaway. Casinos are allowed to remain open but most staff have been asked to stay home, in line with instructions to the city's residents. The government said it would not shut casinos to protect jobs. The stringent measures come after Macao has been largely COVID-free since an outbreak in October 2021. Macao adheres to China's "zero-COVID" policy which aims to eradicate all outbreaks, at just about any cost, running counter to a global trend of trying to co-exist with the virus. Macao's cases are still far below daily infections in other places, including neighboring Hong Kong where cases have jumped to more than 2,000 a day this month. However, it only has one public hospital, whose services are already stretched on a daily basis. The territory has an open border with mainland China, with many residents living and working in the adjoining city of Zhuhai.

Vaccine Update

- **Cambodia:** Foreign minister Prak Sokhonn trip served to provide humanitarian assistance to the people of Myanmar, including the two million COVID-19 vaccine doses that were donated by China through ASEAN and handed over to the crisis-hit country on June 30.
- Vietnam's Prime Minister has ordered faster administration of the third and fourth doses
 of COVID-19 vaccine as part of measures against the unpredictable pandemic

situation, especially when the sub-variant BA.5 has appeared in Vietnam and raised the risk of a new wave of COVID-19 infections. According to the Government Office on July 3 (Sunday), to enhance pandemic control and create favorable conditions for socioeconomic recovery and development, the Government leader assigned Deputy PM Vu Duc Dam to continue directing the Ministry of Health, other ministries and sectors, and 63 provincial-level localities to drastically carry out anti-pandemic measures, especially accelerating COVID-19 vaccination.

Travel Update

- China: According to a notice issued by the Chinese embassy in Washington on July 1 (Friday), China will loosen entry restrictions on US citizens, allowing entrance in case of transit via a third country. According to an updated policy statement, US citizens with valid negative COVID-19 test results looking to enter China may now apply for and receive a green health code for travel from either the United States or a third country. In the past, the embassy would only grant the codes to US citizens flying directly from the United States. The changes follow a similar slight relaxation of COVID-19 testing rules for people arriving in China from countries including the United States.
- Japan: The government on July 1 (Friday) eased its travel warning over the COVID-19 pandemic for 34 countries, including China, South Korea, and India, and is no longer requesting that residents in Japan refrain from nonessential trips to those nations. The Foreign Ministry also lowered its travel advisory for France, Germany and Italy, as well as other 11 European nations, by one notch to the lowest Level 1 on its four-point scale, advising Japanese nationals traveling to those regions to "stay fully alert." The total number of areas under the Level 1 category has increased to 70. In late May, Japan moved 36 countries and regions to the lowest level, including the United States, Britain, Canada and Hong Kong. The relaxation of the warning for South Korea came two days after flights between Seoul's Gimpo airport and Tokyo's Haneda airport resumed its operations. Meanwhile, 90 nations and regions remain under the Level 2 warning, including 16 in Asia and Oceania, such as Taiwan, Indonesia and Australia, along with 27 European nations. As for the Level 3 advisory, which urges residents to avoid all travel, all 41 countries remain unchanged.




COVID-19 Epi curve among ASEAN Countries:

From January 1, 2021 to July 3, 2022




COVID-19 Weekly New Cases and Weekly New Deaths
