COVID-19: Highlights and Situation Overview

Global Update

- Worldwide, there have been over 548 million cases and over 6 million deaths attributed to COVID-19.
- **Cuba:** According to a recent statement by Director General of the World Health Organization (WHO), Tedros Adhanom, only 57 nations in the world have managed to immunize 70% of their population, most of them high-income countries. He said that in some countries there is insufficient willingness to carry out immunization. This was affected by the initial lack of political commitment to equitable access to vaccines. Adhanom also called on territories that reached 70% to provide support to those lagging behind, and urged vigilance and preparedness to reintroduce and adjust social and health measures as needed. WHO executive noted that more than two years after the most severe health crisis in a century, the organization reported over 6 million deaths from COVID-19, but new estimates of excess mortality are higher: nearly 15 million. While almost one billion people are waiting for a dose to protect them against COVID-19, Cuba made history with an immunization campaign that stands out for being massive and free.

Regional Update

- **Brunei:** Some 9.3% of the Brunei population have received the fourth dose of the COVID-19 vaccine, while 72.6% have received the third dose, according to a daily statement by the Ministry of Health (MoH). Meanwhile, 72.9% of children aged five to 11 have received two doses of the vaccine while 49.1% have received the third.
- **Indonesia:** The Health Ministry received 300 vaccine refrigerators donated by the Japanese government to support COVID-19 vaccination program in Indonesia. During the aid handover event here on June 26, Health Minister Budi Gunadi Sadikin noted that logistical facility became one of the factors that determined Indonesia's success in implementing COVID-19 vaccination program over the last 17 months. The availability of logistics in the form of cold temperature vaccine storage facility had contributed to 15% of the country's readiness in winning the war against the pandemic. The procurement of 300 vaccine refrigerator equipment units aims to support Indonesia in realizing global health system resiliency. These vaccine refrigerator units have been distributed since two days ago and more will come this year to ensure the success of COVID-19 vaccination in the country, he said.
- **Philippines:** Metro Manila and Quezon City led the list of regions and cities, respectively, with the greatest number of new COVID-19 cases recorded on Saturday, the OCTA Research Group reported on June 26. OCTA fellow Guido David said Quezon City accounted for 74 of the 353 new COVID infections in the National Capital Region, followed by Manila with 52, Makati with 39 and Pasig with 31. Based on the Department of Health (DOH)'s COVID-19 tracker, 777 new COVID-19 cases were recorded on Saturday, bringing to 6,425 the total number of active cases nationwide. Outside Metro Manila, Cavite posted the most number of new COVID infections with 62 followed by Iloilo with 41, Cebu with 40 and Batangas with 37. The DOH on Saturday classified five areas in Metro Manila under moderate risk for COVID-19. The National Capital Region also posted a slight increase in COVID-19 positivity rate, according to the DOH.
- **Singapore:** All households in Singapore will receive 10 antigen rapid test kits amid a spike in COVID-19 infections. The Straits Times reported Deputy Prime Minister Lawrence Wong making the announcement after touring a mobile vaccination centre in Yishun on Monday (27 June). Distribution of the kits will begin some time next month. Wong, who is

the co-chairman of the multi-ministry taskforce for COVID-19, also told reporters that there is no need to tighter safe management measures for now. However, this cannot be ruled out, as cases are expected to continue to rise. The Straits Times reported him as saying that the uptick in the number of infections is driven by the newer BA.4 and BA.5 Omicron sub-variants. The Ministry of Health had said on 21 June that the two variants accounted for around 30 per cent of all virus cases in the past week, up from 17 per cent the week before. Wong, who was with Health Minister and MTF co-chairman Ong Ye Kung during the tour, told reporters that there is no evidence yet that current infections are more severe. With hospitals still able to cope with the situation, Wong said that Singapore should be able to "ride through this wave" without having to tighten existing measures. However, he stressed that the situation is fluid, and urged Singaporeans to be vigilant and do testing.

- **Thailand:** The actual number of COVID-19 infections must be 10 times higher than reported by the Public Health Ministry as most patients develop mild symptoms, top virologist Yong Poovorawan said on Sunday (June 26) Thailand recorded 2,378 COVID-19 cases and 17 deaths on Sunday, according to the ministry. Dr. Yong also pointed out that the number of children infected by COVID-19 has surged now that schools have reopened, triggering a spread among families. With children, he said, it was difficult to tell if they have the common flu or COVID-19. He reckoned that COVID-19 infections will start dropping between October and December, before rising again in January, when respiratory diseases usually peak. He added that patients with mild symptoms were less infectious than those with severe symptoms. Also, those with mild symptoms recover quickly, he added.

Vaccine Update

- **Philippines:** The administration of COVID-19 booster shots to healthy minors has been postponed, the National Vaccination Operations Center said Sunday. NVOC Chairperson and Health Undersecretary Dr. Myrna Cabotaje said the rollout was pushed back after the Health Technology Assessment Council said the administration of boosters for non-immunocompromised minors aged 12-17 could continue only when the adult population reached 40-70% booster coverage. In a separate radio interview, Cabtoaje said they hoped a decision on the matter could be made within the day. The booster rollout was supposed to start on June 25 for healthy minors who got their second primary dose at least five months prior. Administration of booster shots for immunocompromised minors began earlier in the week, with a 28-day interval from the second dose.

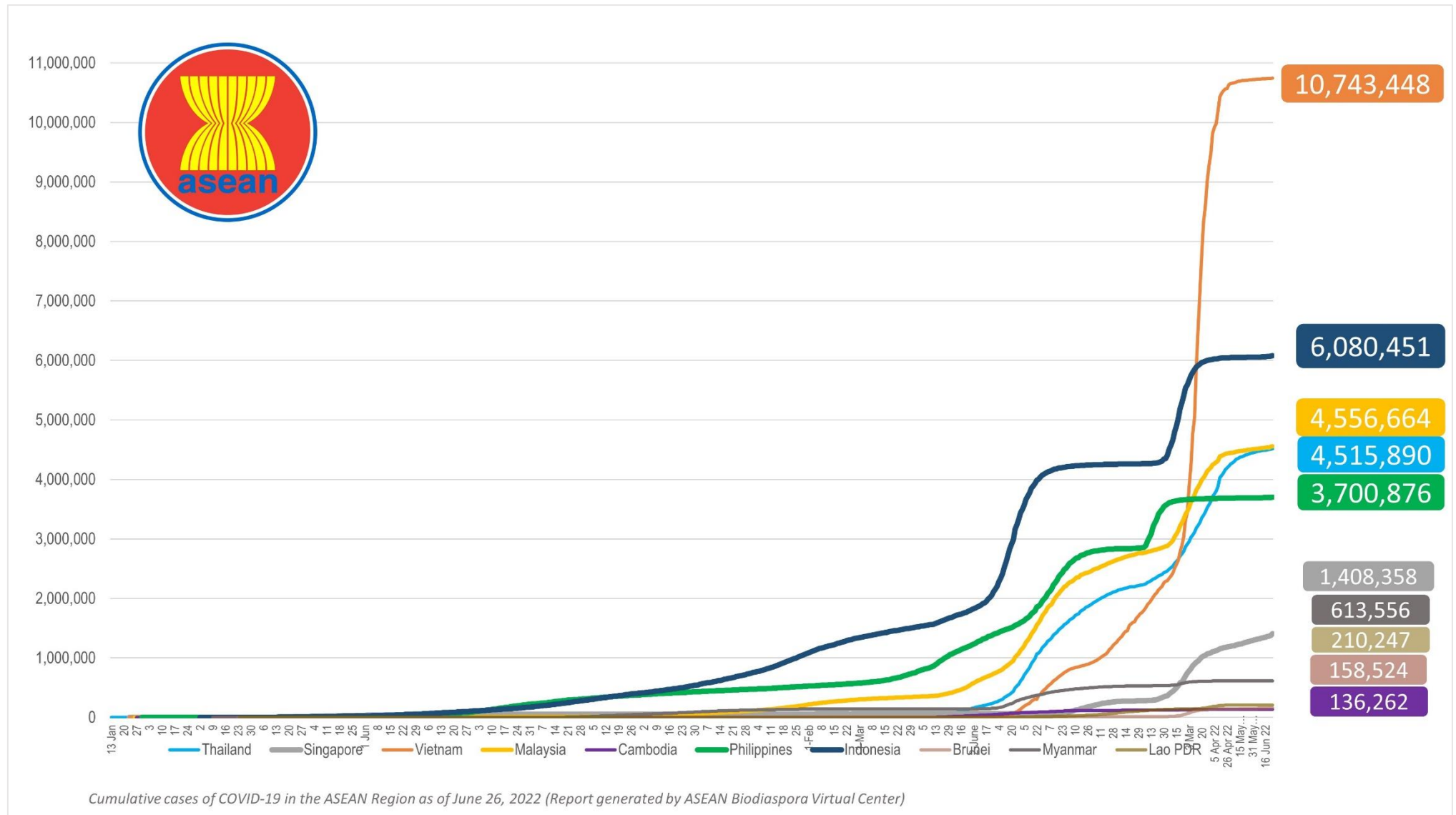
Cases and Deaths as of 27 June 2022

- As of 27 June 2022 (2PM, GMT+8), worldwide, there were **548,433,320** confirmed cases, including **6,356,258** deaths. Globally, Case Fatality Rate (CFR) was **1.2**.
- 64,573,440 confirmed cases** of COVID-19 have been reported in the **ASEAN +3** countries including **32,124,276 cases** in the ASEAN region and **32,449,164 cases** in the PLUS THREE countries, with CFR of **0.7**.

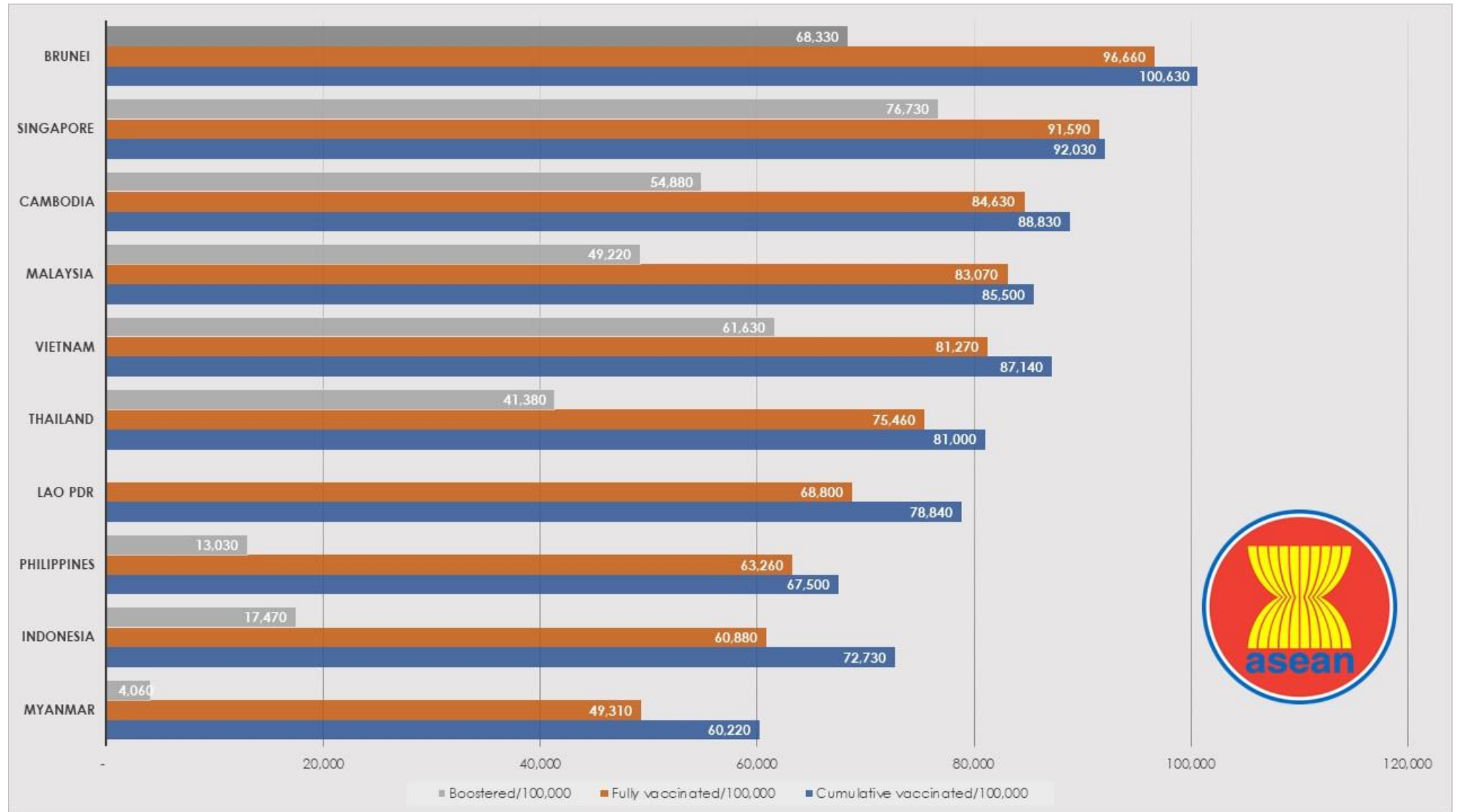
COVID-19 Epi curve among ASEAN Countries:
